- For example: comparing the performance of the synchronous machine with the doubly fed induction machine








Three-phase induction motor



The stator consists of wound 'poles' that carry the supply current to induce a magnetic field that penetrates the rotor. In a very simple motor, there would be a single projecting piece of the stator (a salient pole) for each pole, with windings around it; in fact, to optimize the distribution of the magnetic field, the windings are distributed in many slots located around the stator, but the magnetic field still has the same number of north-south alternations. The number of 'poles' can vary between motor types but the poles are always in pairs (i.e. 2, 4, 6, etc.).

Synchronous Machine Construction



(a) Two-pole cylindrical rotor machine


(b) Four-pole salient rotor machine

Cross sections of two synchronous machines. The relative positions of the stator and rotor poles are shown for motor action. Torque is developed in the direction of rotation because the rotor poles try to align themselves with the opposite stator poles.

DC MACHINES

Real DC machine Construction

- <u>Stator</u>: Stationary part of the machine. The stator carries a field winding that is used to produce the required magnetic field by DC excitation. Often know as the field.
- <u>Rotor</u>: The rotor is the rotating part of the machine. The rotor carries a distributed winding, and is the winding where the emf is induced. Also known as the armature.


