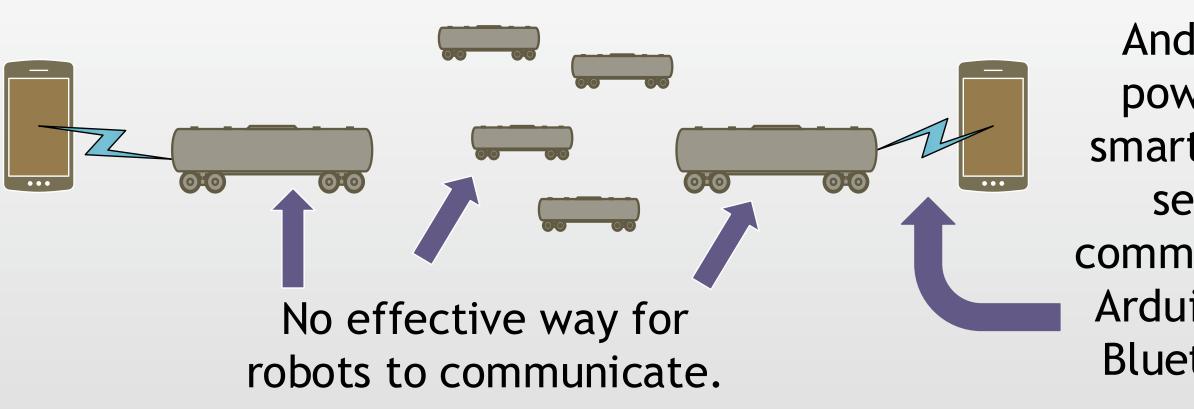

Design and develop a protocol for managing robots on our network.



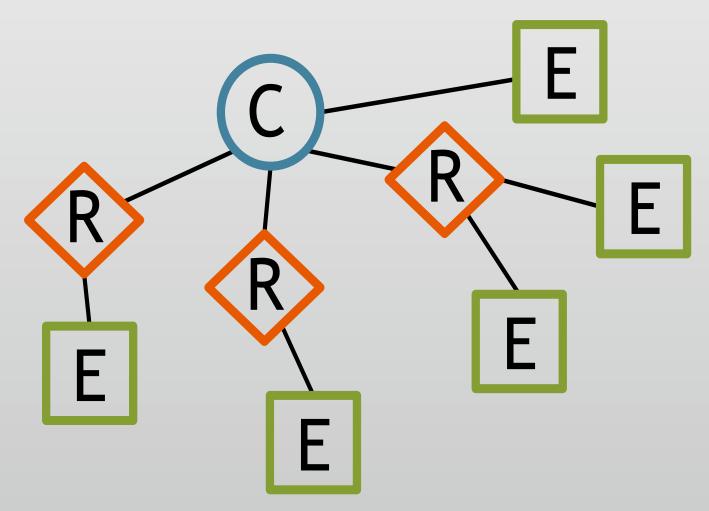
One current COTS Bot design using an RC Car body.

Androidpowered smartphone sends commands to Arduino via Bluetooth.

The ZigBee Protocol can only have one Coordinator Node which is programmed in the firmware and each role has specific functions. ZigBee Networks also require a parent/child relationship which increases time for endpoints to receive messages.



ZigBee Topology based on 802.15.4 Each node above represents a single robot in the network and its role.

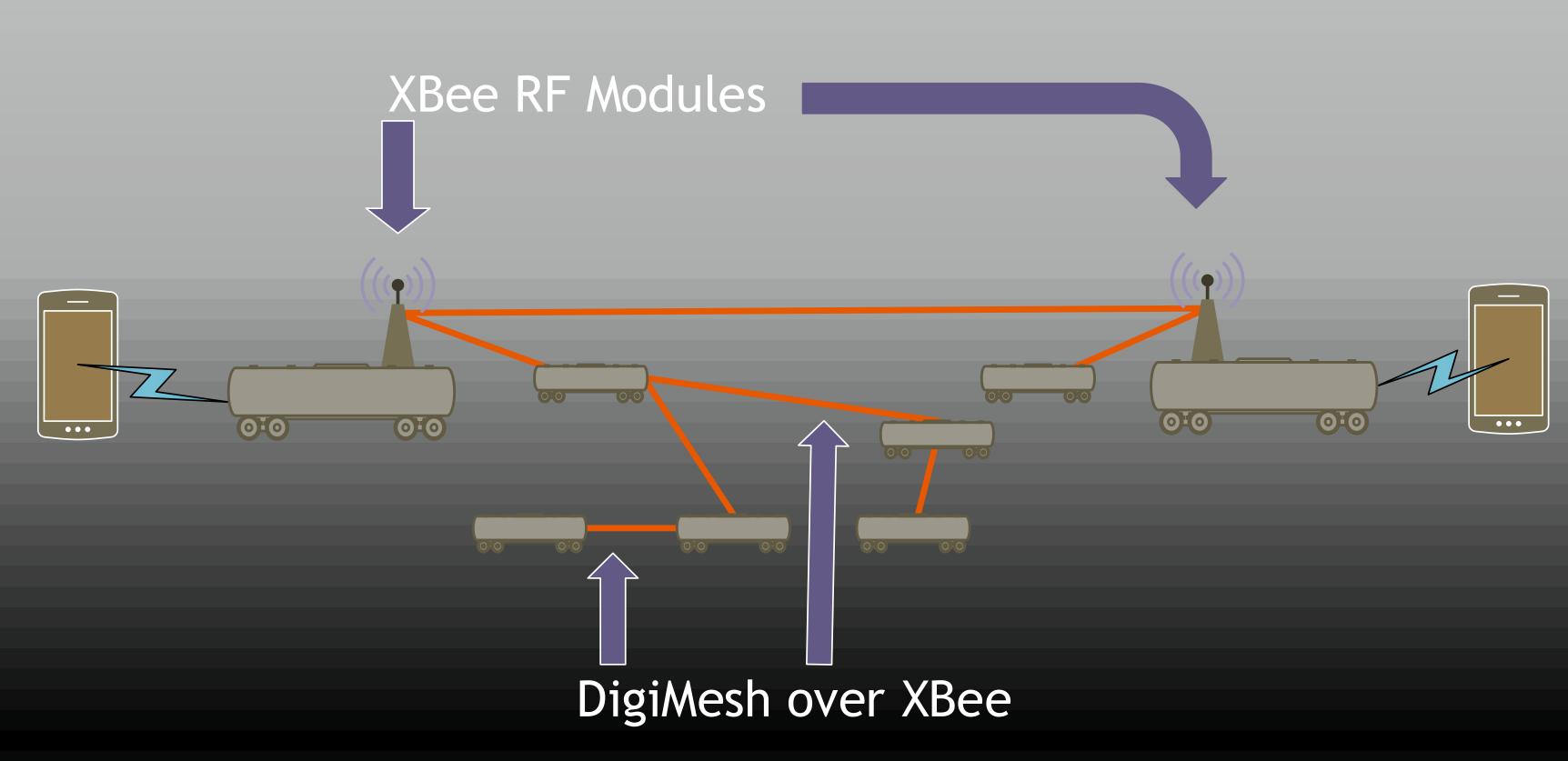
- **C**: Coordinator

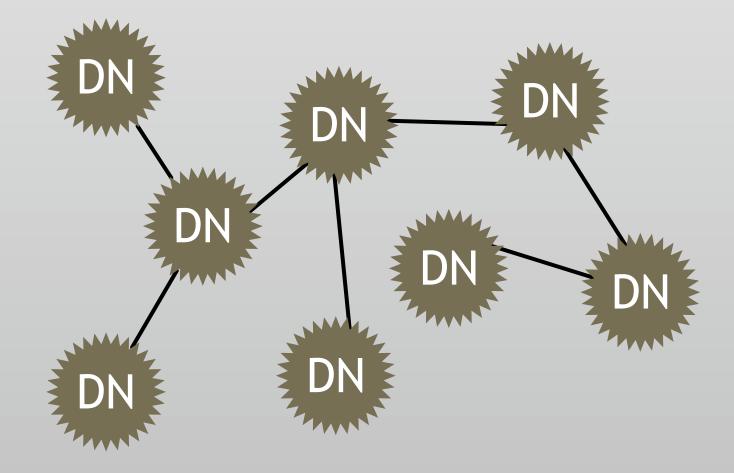

Design & Solution

XBee Series 1 RF Modules using DigiMesh firmware connected to the Arduino will provide the communication infrastructure at the physical layer for networking the robots. The DigiMesh protocol additionally allows for larger packet payloads and provides a longer range (up to 40 miles).

We then create a protocol that is loosely based on Simple Network Message Protocol (SNMP) to craft small packets with any data payload. This allows for future expansion without modifications to the protocol.
