Design, build, and evaluate a variable speed and variable incline treadmill for exploring the impact of locomotor activity on the development of motor control and musculoskeletal tissues. (Fig. 1)

- An intuitive peripheral control interface
- Operational speeds ranging from 0.5 15 cm/s
- Larger system for future research directions
- Easily replicable components
- Open source software allowing for customization
- Simple disassembly for cleaning and belt replacement

FUTURE IMPACT

- Allows for further understanding of behavioral and physiological responses to exercise in murine models
- Cost effective model to reduce the barrier of entry into research for small/new labs (>\$10000 for commercial models)
- Simplistic model eliminates need for training personal to maximize results of research.
