48/53-foot Trailer

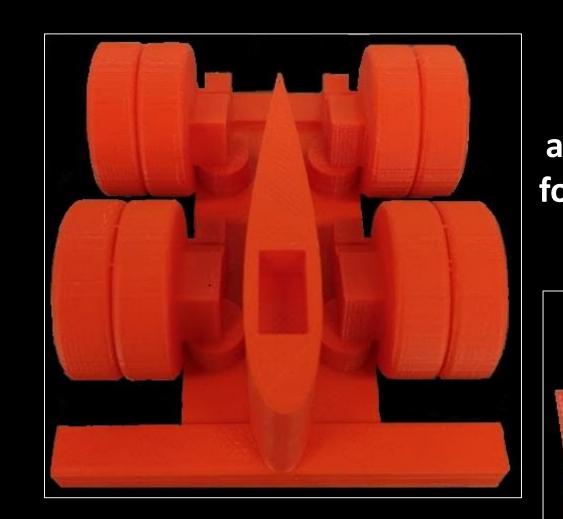


A-Train Trailer

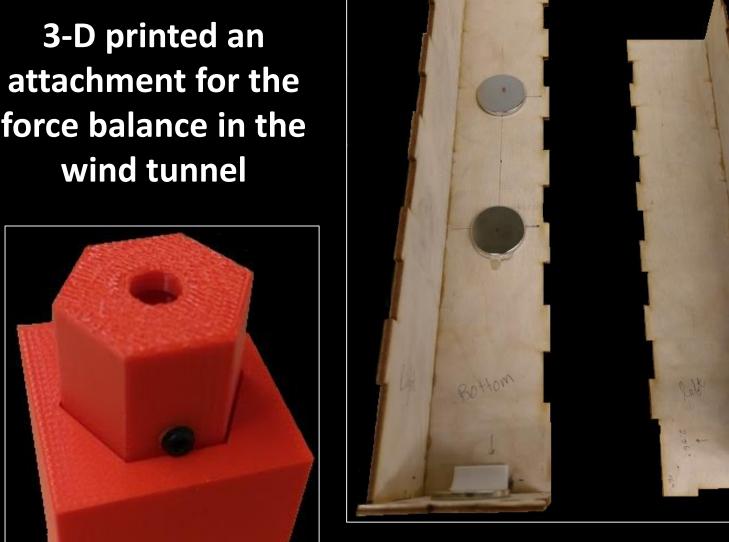


Project Learning

Implemented an airfoil strut for additional front-end support.

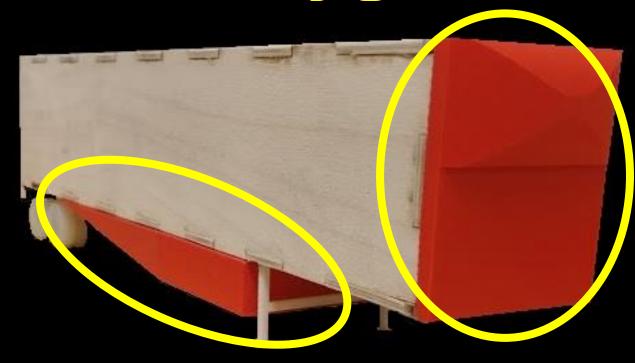


Laser cut side panels for our 48-foot model.

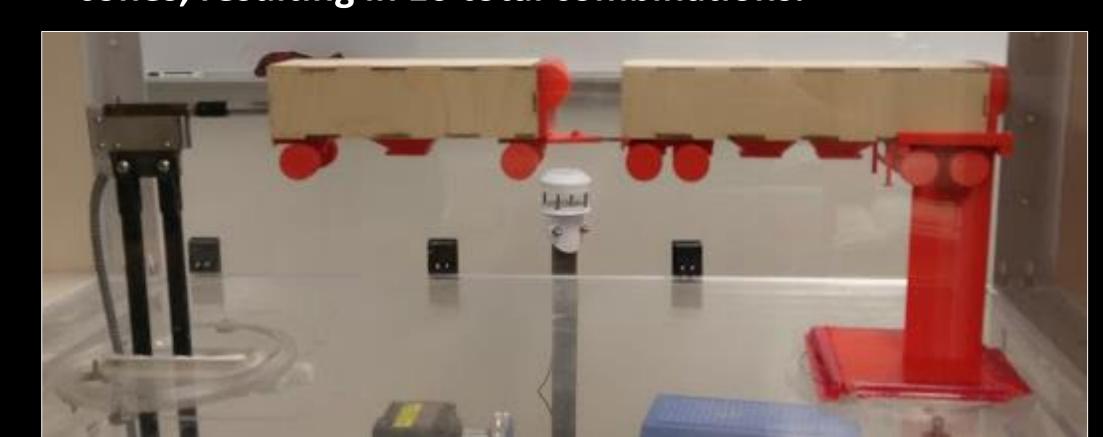
Trailer Configurations



Interchangeable features on our models were located on the front and bottom of the trailers.

The A-Train configurations were tested at distances of 7 feet, 9 feet, 14 feet, 16 feet and 21 feet separation between one another, along with hopper bins and nose cones, resulting in 10 total combinations.

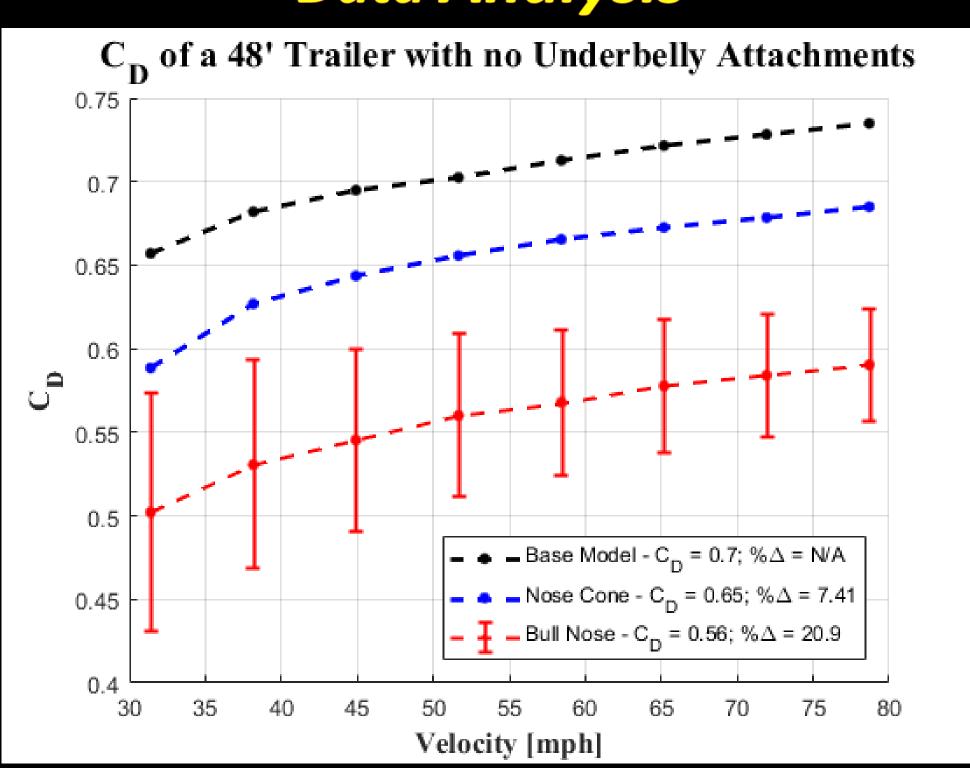


Wind Tunnel



Drag force data, acquired from readouts on the wind tunnel, were collected from two separate runs of each model to reduce error. The wind tunnel was ran from about 30mph to about 78mph.

Data Analysis



From the data analysis, we saw that every attachment created significant reductions in aerodynamic drag with respect to the base model.
