	 Once the rail is no longer in contact with the pins it is resting on the
	 Do the arms need to be that long?
	 It can be shorter and move the entire thing forward towards the user
	 Swing arm stops
	 They think it will work from a kinematic standpoint
	 Doesn't need assistance all the way in, just that last little bit
	Idea 2 - Jaime (rack and pinion)
	 Simple - materials?
	 Idea 3 - Jaime (rubber grip surface)

	 Might have too much friction from rubber
	 Could add to the force total to overcome

	 Need a stop point for exit and entry

	 Would lock the tray in place
	 They don't have an issue with that
	 S&J Concerned about space
	• Most expensive
	 Their least favorite idea
	Idea 5 - Davis (Puzzle piece)
	 2-step process
	 Pull latches out (to pull past card slot)
	 Lift the tray out
	 Unless you can put a pin that will allow the arm to go past 90 deg.
	Getting the tray out would be an issue
	 Extending past the plane of the chassis would not be ideal
	 Theory is good, but it would need some development
