

# Dehydrating Mustard Seed Extract

## Objective

Develop a flash evaporator that reduces the water content in a mustard seed extract slurry by half.

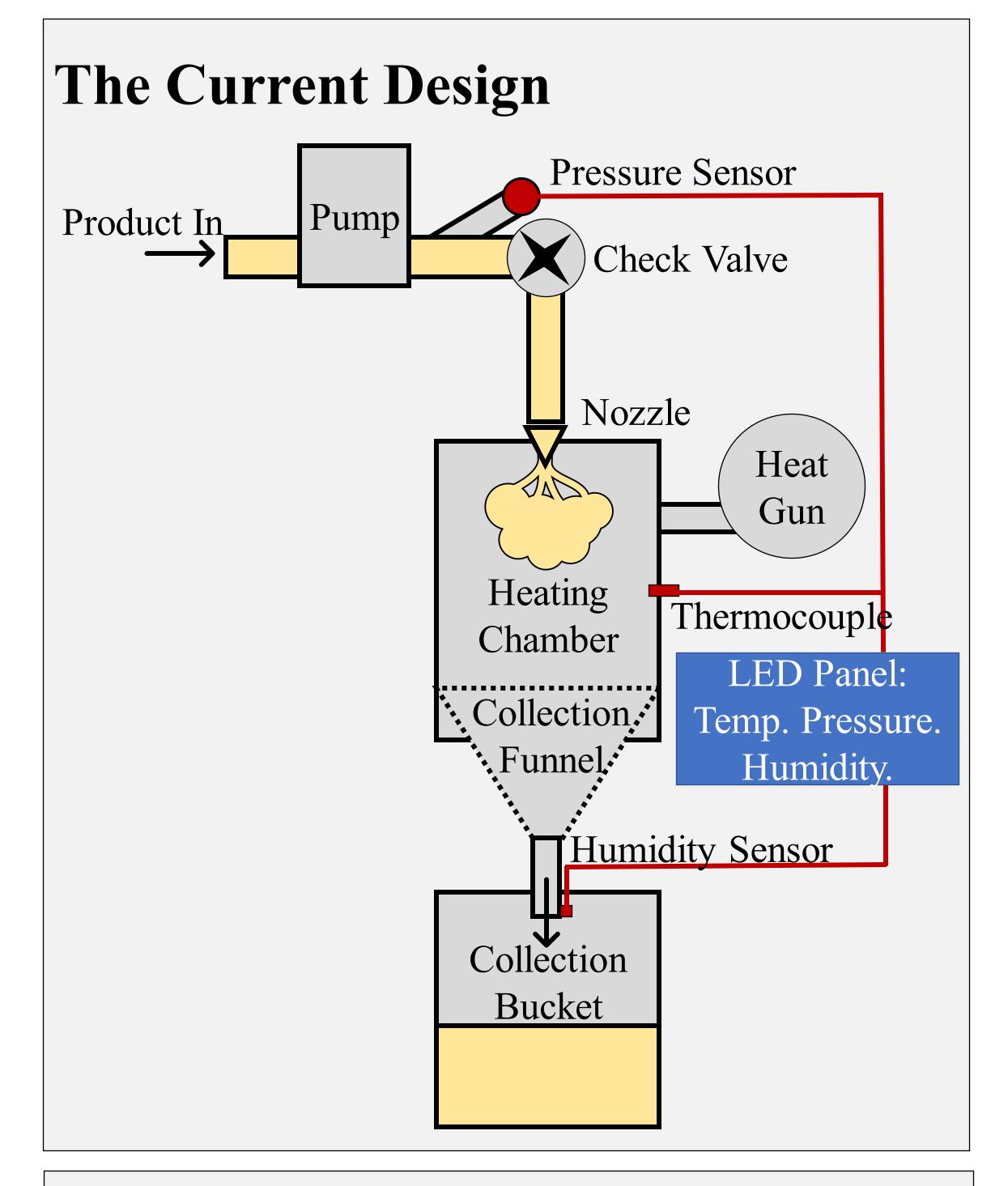
#### Background

- Mustard plants produce many useful chemical products
  - Oils that can be processed into biodiesel
    and glucosinolates they show promise on
    being used as biopestcides
- Drying methods available
  - Drum dry, freeze dry, and spray dry
  - Freeze drying currently takes three days for a 10-gallon batch

## **Key Requirements**

- Get extract 50% dry
- Reduce drying time by at least half
- No large drop in glucosinolate yields due to thermal degradation
- No chemicals due to organic farming use
- Handle up to 10 gallons of product a day

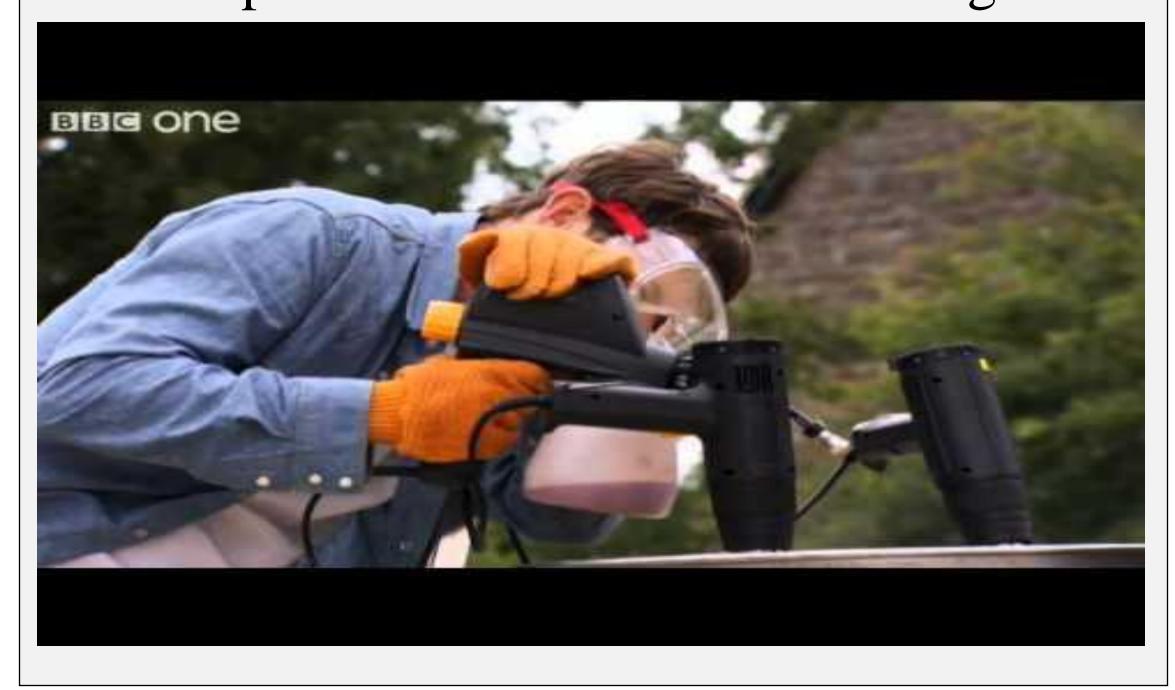

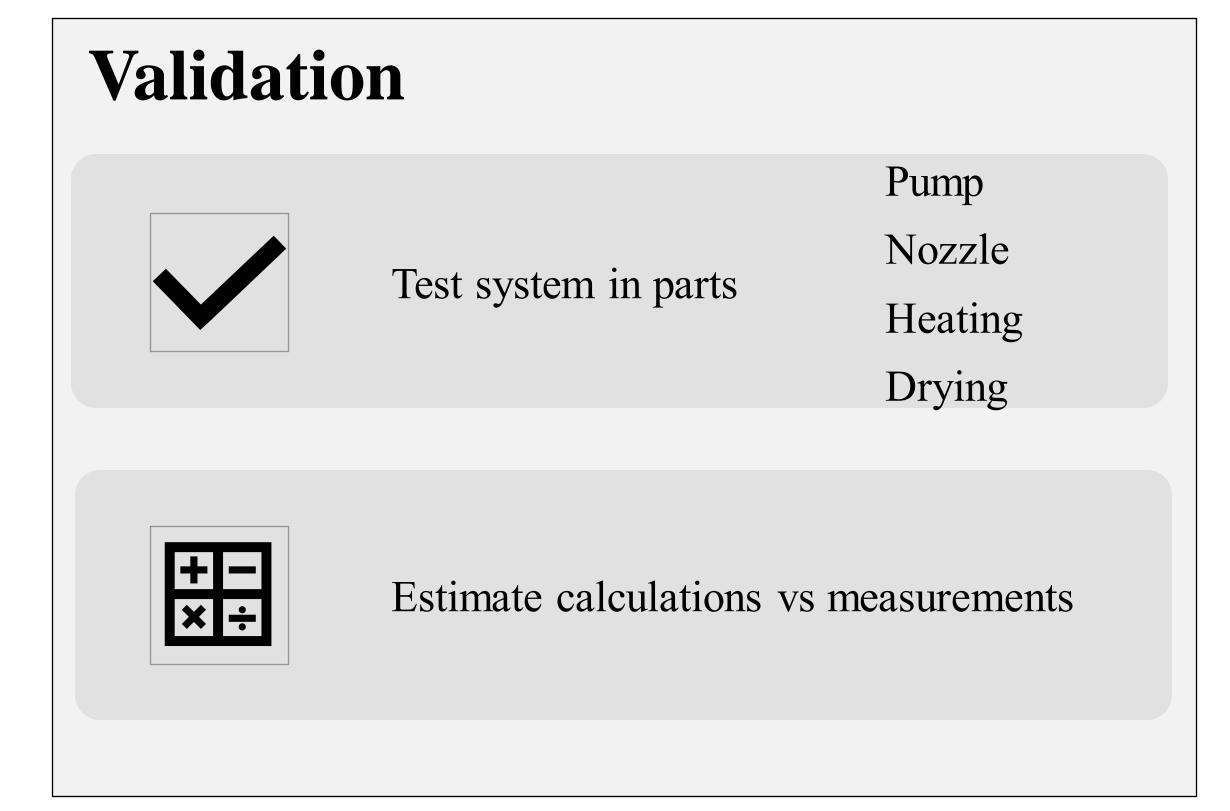


## **Concept Development**
