Revitalization of Robotic Work Cell

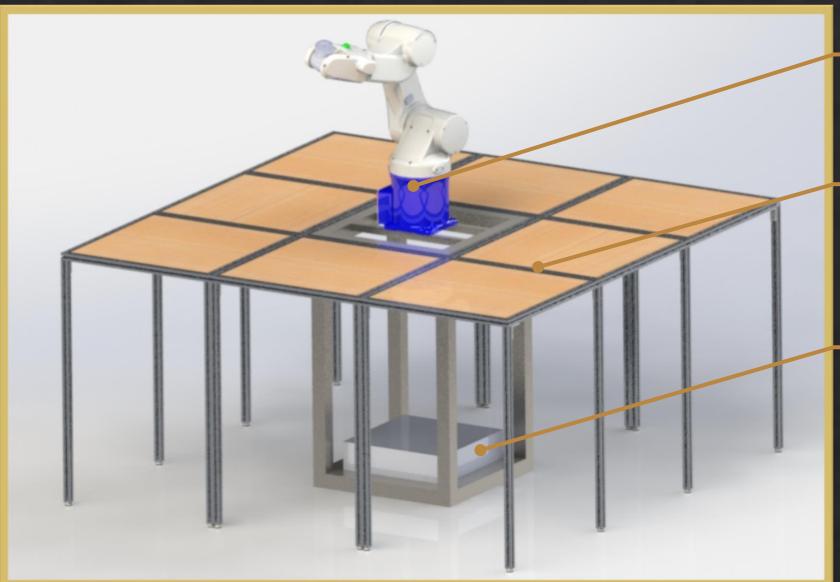
Problem Statement

A second generation robotic workcell needs to be created such that it incorporates the following:

- modular design,
- eliminates movement & vibration under load,
- able to include a second robotic arm,
- includes standalone document of operation.

Project Results

Our team designed a new, modular workcell that includes a permanent enclosure with a steel pedestal and a thorough training manual.



Workcell Use Manual

A user manual was developed to help teach future students about using the workcell and basic robotic programming.



Permanent walls enclose dedicated 12x12 ft. workspace for robots

2 doors provide easy access to workcell, e-Gard electronic lockout is used

DENSO VS-577G 6 axis robotic arm

Modular tables allow the work surface to be tailored to different processes

RC7M Controller operates robot, I/O for end effectors and lockout interface

Render of Final Workcell



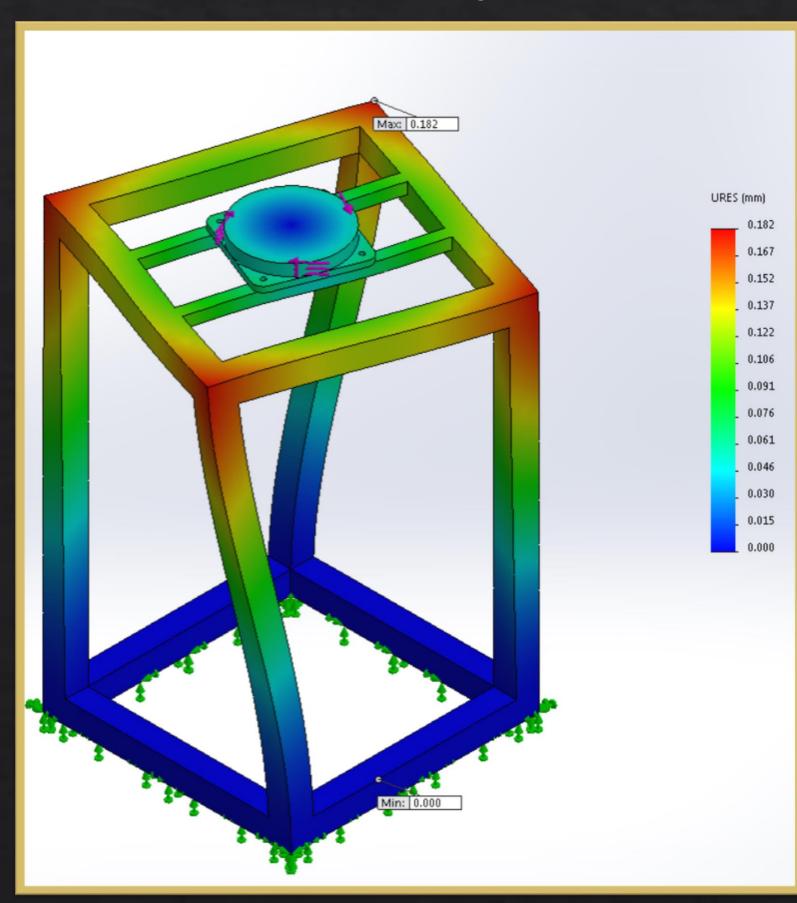
E-Gard Electronic Lockout

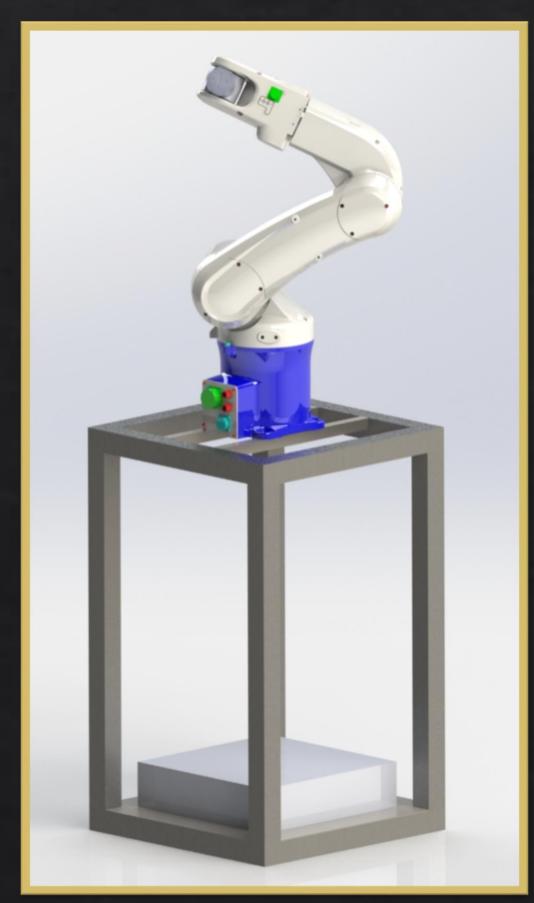
The e-Gard lockout is attached to the main entrance and disables robot movement when an operator is inside the workcell. This system meets all OSHA safety standards for a robotic manufacturing workcell.



Pedestal Design

FEA demonstrates pedestal (steel tubing) has minimal deflection and no movement under robot weight or maximum rotational force of the robot.



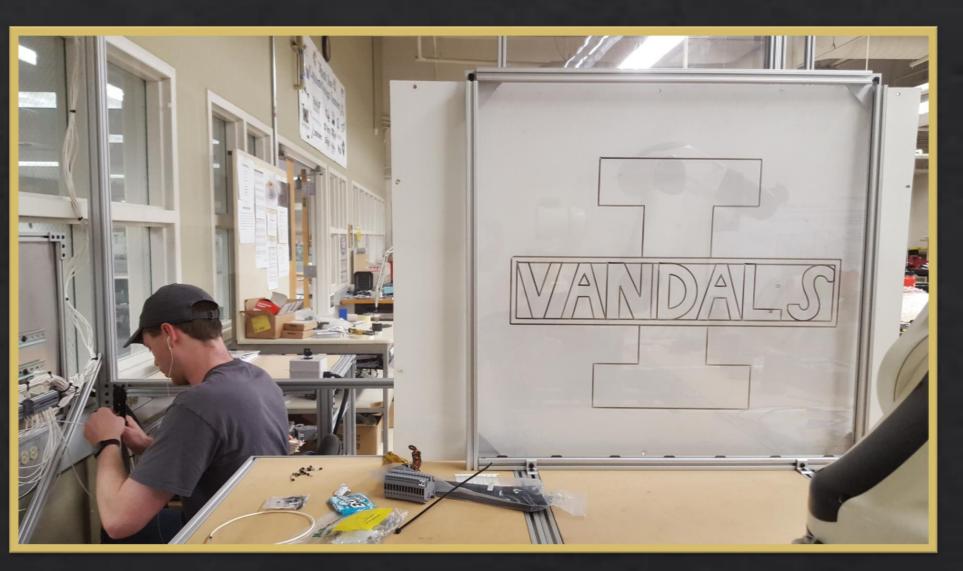


A custom end effector was developed for each procedure. To the right is a pneumatic gripper that utilizes the robot's air solenoid system to grab cups to be stacked.
