Methods of Testing

We designed and built a water table where cross-sectional models could be tested. The resulting hydraulic jumps generated in thin, laminar flows are analogous to shock behavior.

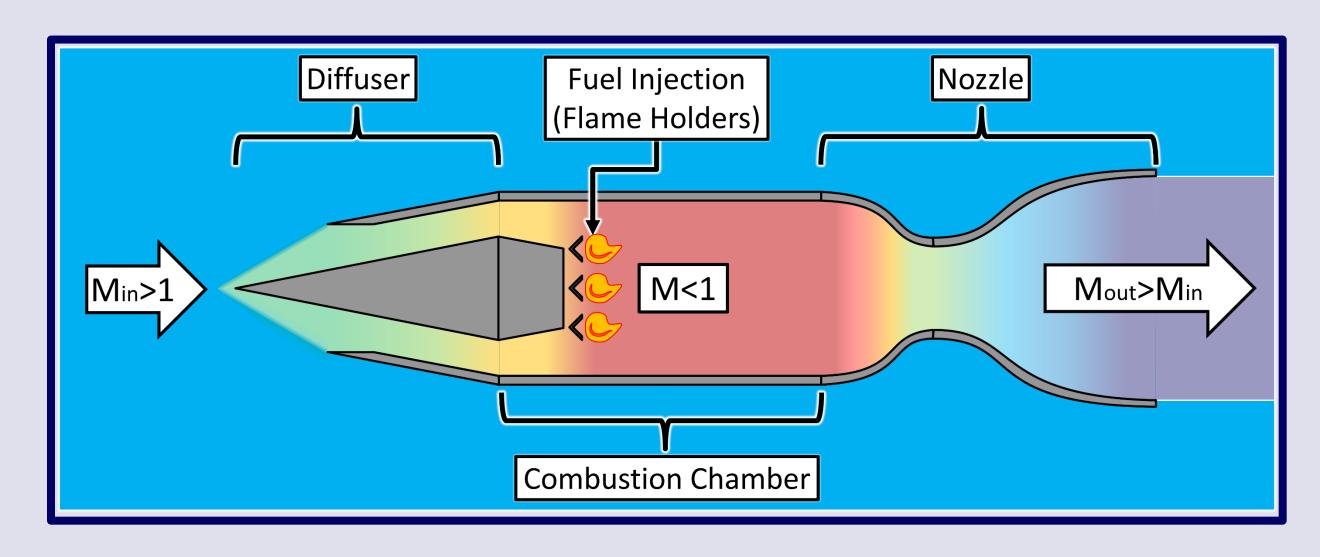

Problem

To reach a ramjet's operating speed, a separate propulsion motor is required for acceleration. Integrating a solid-fuel rocket into the ramjet design removes the need for a staged booster. This hybridization reduces the overall weight and cost of the ramjet system.



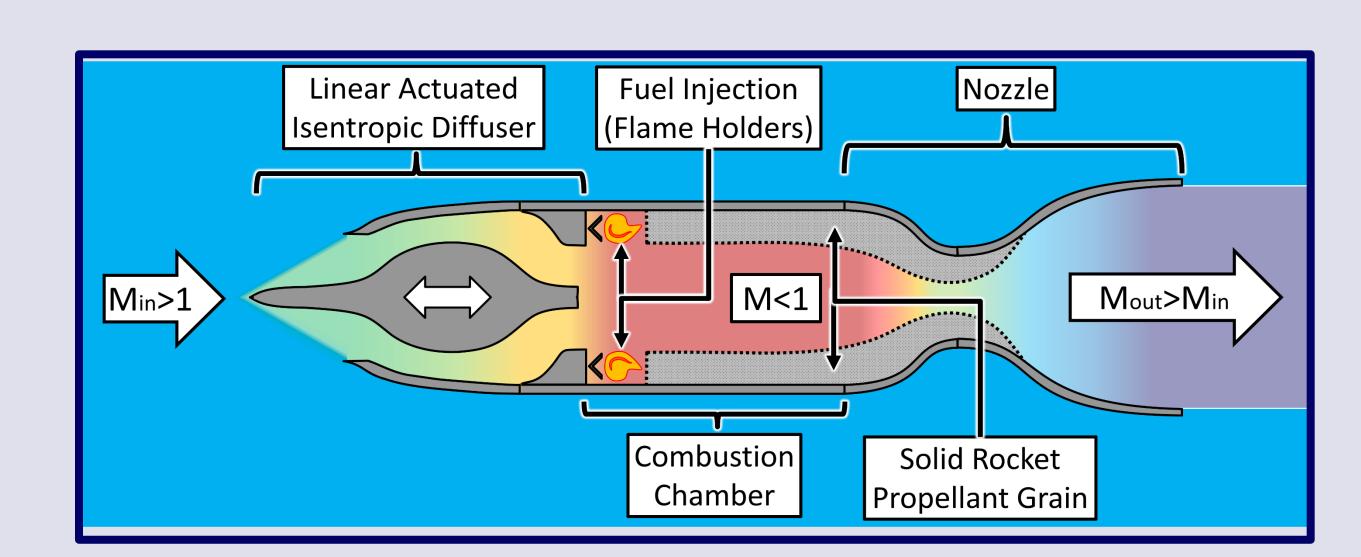
Project Goal

Using a moveable nose cone, develop mechanisms of the IRR to:

- Unify ramjet and solid rocket combustion chambers
- Ensure smooth transition from solid rocket to ramjet operation at approximately Mach 3
- Optimize inlet for variable intake conditions

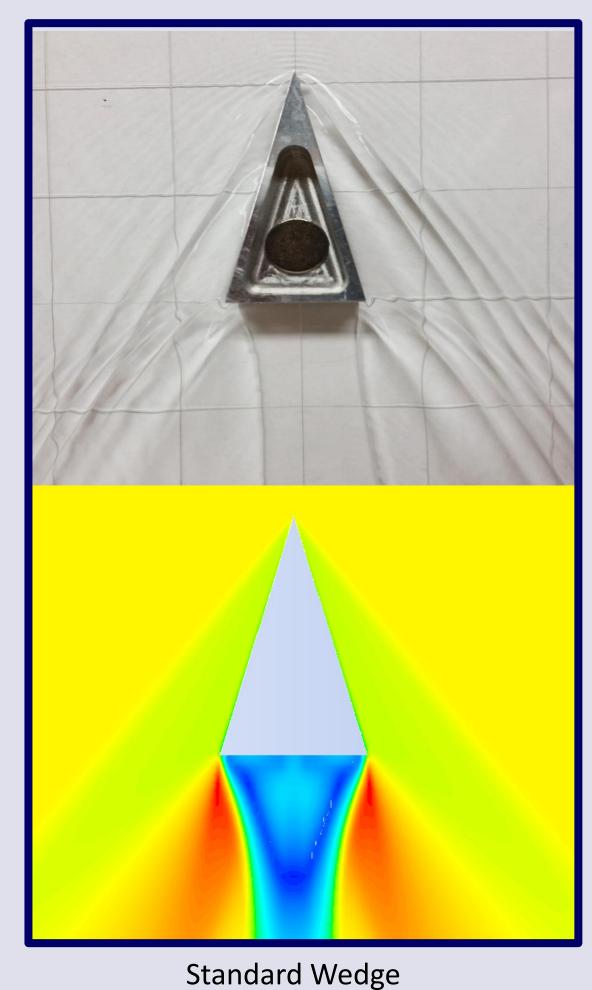
Solution Concept

- Linearly actuated nose cone shuts off air flow and optimizes shock behavior for pressure recovery
- Nose cone shaped for isentropic compression
- Propellant grain cast in ramjet combustion chamber to unify flow



Simulation & Validation

Comparison between Water Table experimentation and Computational Fluid Dynamic (CFD) simulation shows similar flow characteristics. Testing is done equating Froude and Mach numbers at 2:



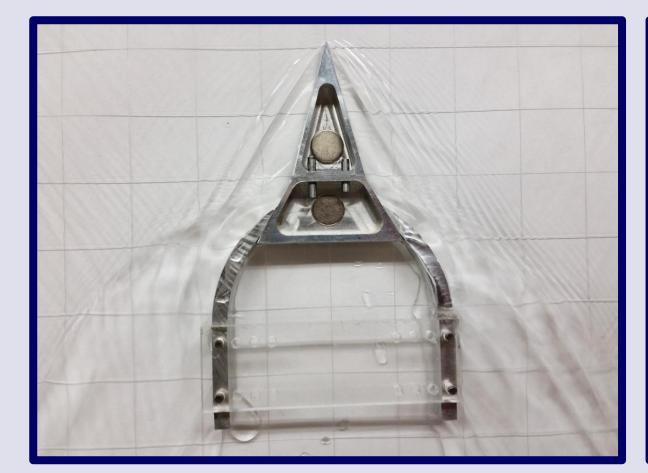
Standard Wedge 15° Turning Angle
