CO2 Saturation



In order to saturate a fluid with CO2 efficiently, two criteria must be met:

The chamber must be well sealed

The fluid must be as cold as possible

Most types of algae thrive with large concentrations of CØ2 in their environment

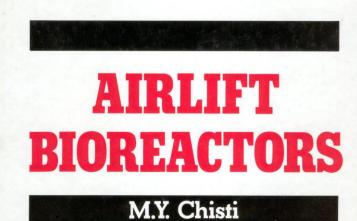
Design Logic

In order to minimize CO2 waste, the system must be sealed with as little air gap as possible at the top to promote the saturation of gas into the tank water

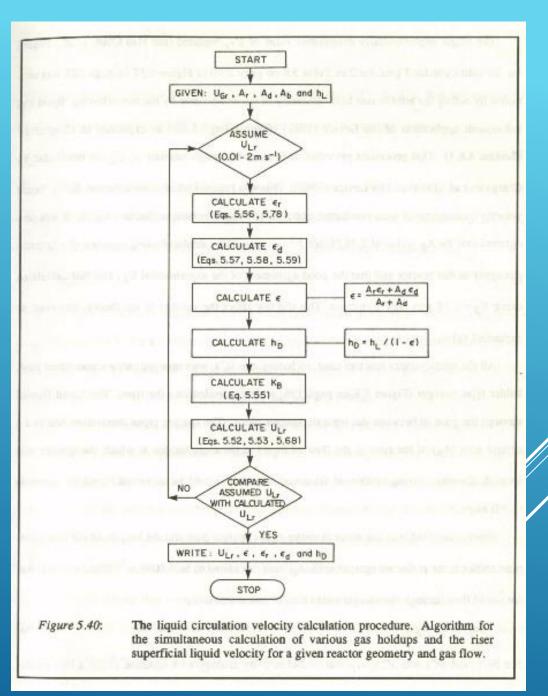
The circulation system must use as little gas as possible while still maintaining a functional circulation velocity

The continuous nature of the system allows it to be filled as it is also drained, which should help limit gas pressure build up.

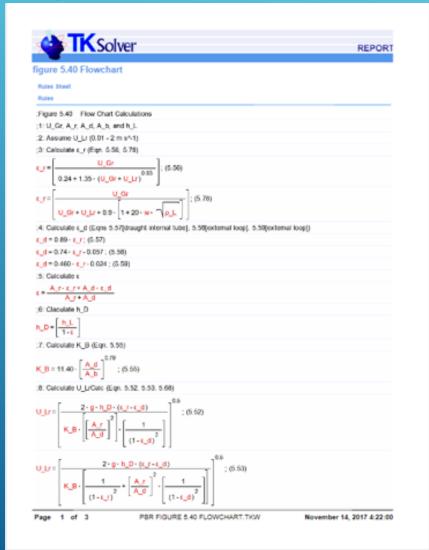

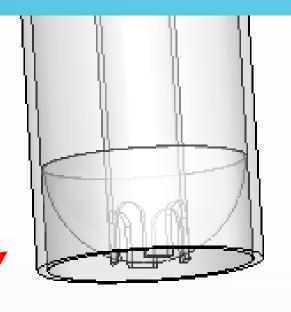


Initial Designs



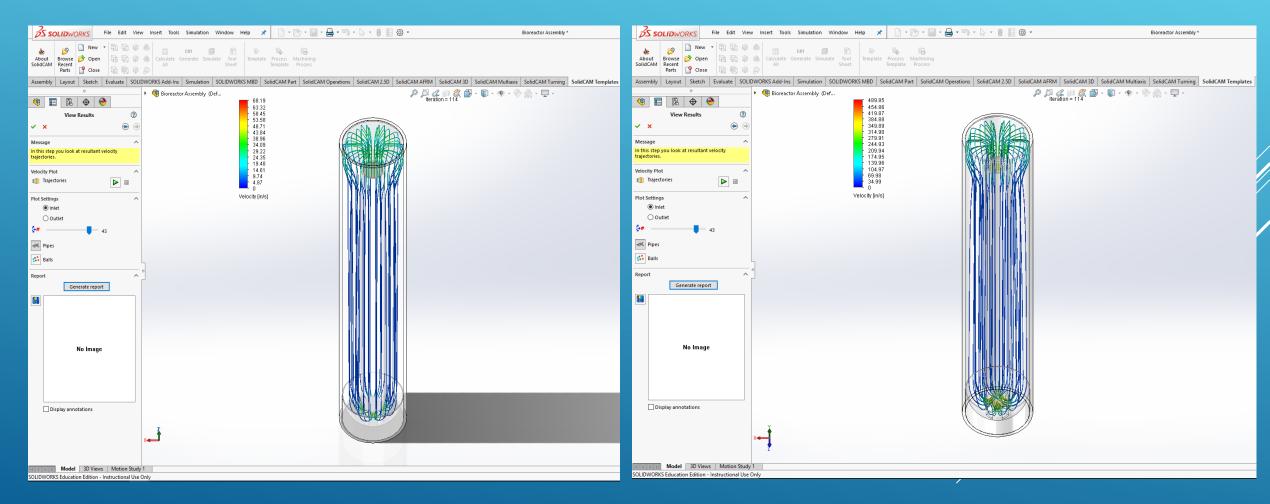


Concentric Design

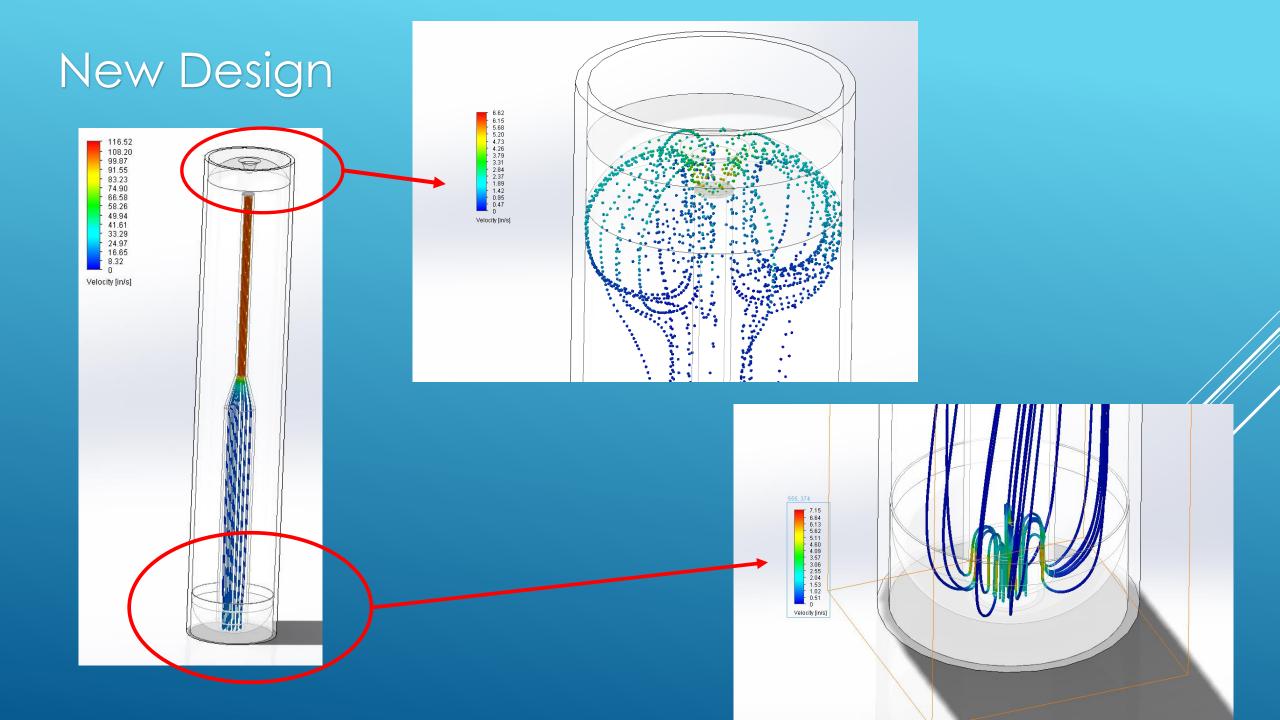

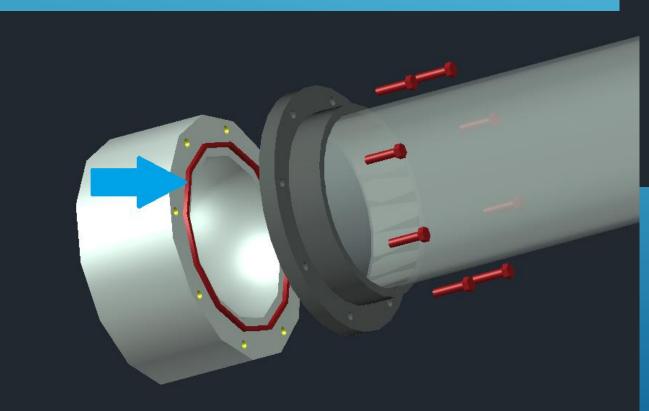

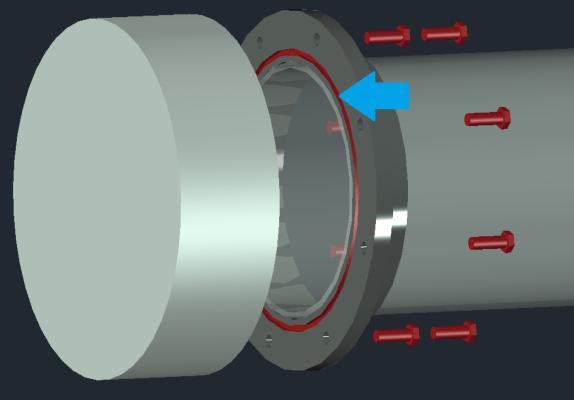
Lessons Learned From Flow Simulation

- Bottom slots (may) allow gas into the down comer
- A flatter bottom with concave corners is more efficient
- A guided lid surface may help redirect momentum out of the riser downward and thus promote circulation



Base Fastening

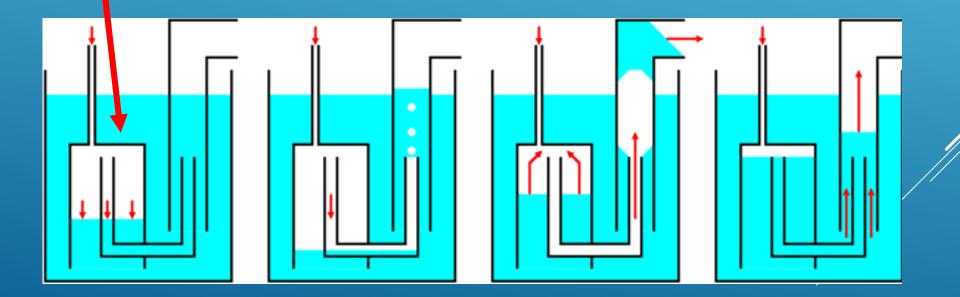






Another Proposition

Premix tank water with gas and use an auto-siphon mechanism to circulate the fluid This system (referred to as a geyser pump) would be able to generate a higher circulation force without using a separate pump



Steps in Choosing Light

Determine the major pigments in the algae strain

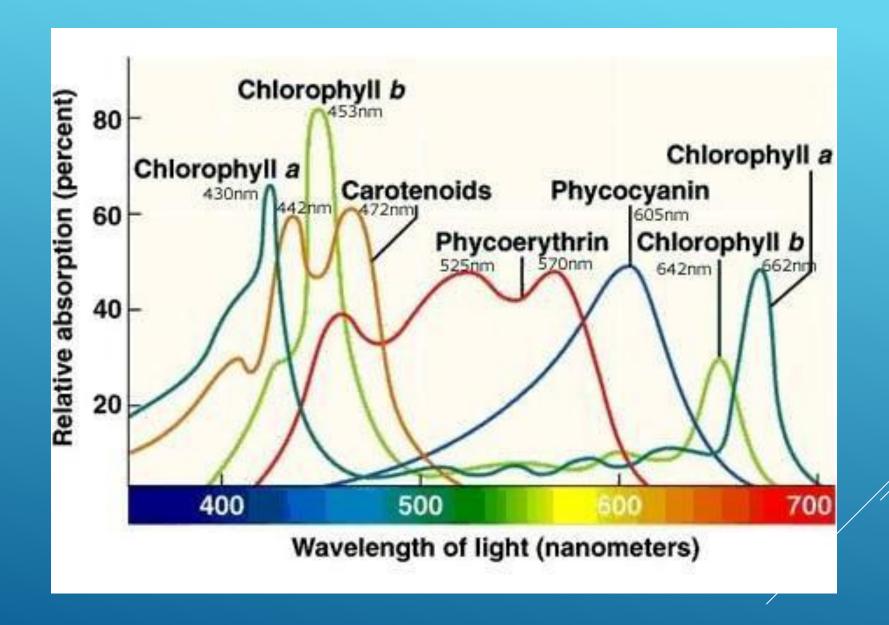
Choose a light type that emits wavelengths to be absorbed by previous pigments

Choose light array that fits our needs and design

Wavelengths and Pigments

Different algae and plants absorb different wavelengths of light based on their types of pigments.

- Chlorophyll-a all plants, algae, and cyanobacteria (bacteria that get energy from light)
- Chlorophyll-b green algae and land plants
- Carotenoids all plants and algae
- Phycoerythrin red algae
- Phycocyanin cyanobacteria

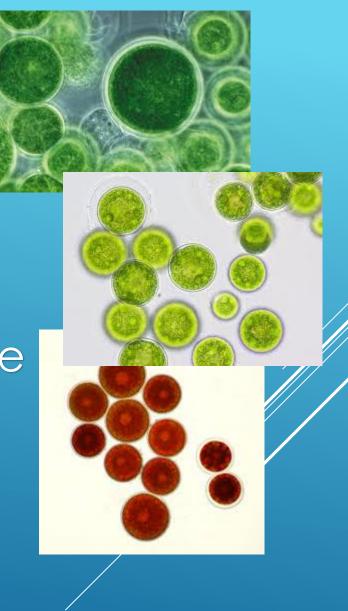

So, What Are We Going to Do?

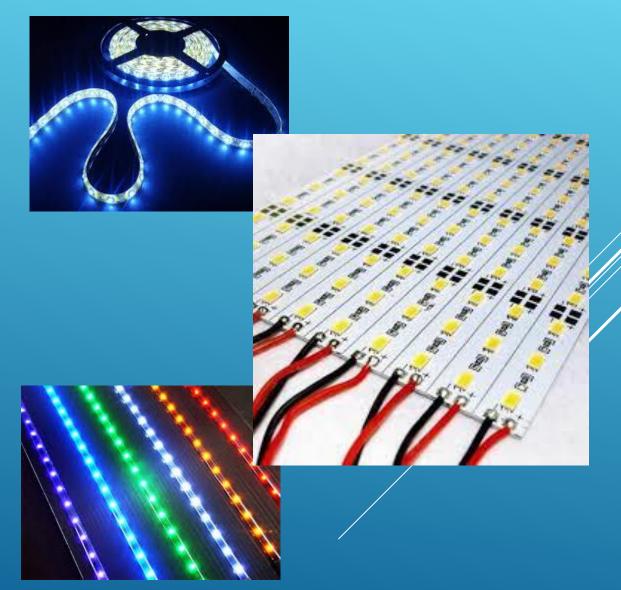
► RBG LED Customizable to any visible wavelength ► Use very low power ► Cheap Program with Arduino



How Are We Going to Build It?

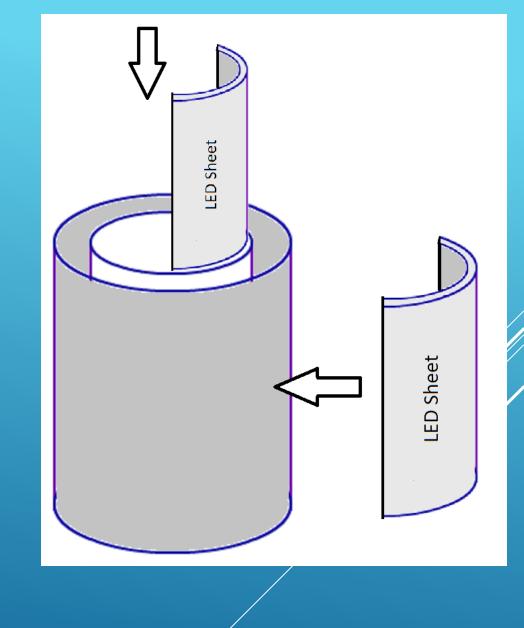
Use sheets of LED strips

Incorporation to the Design

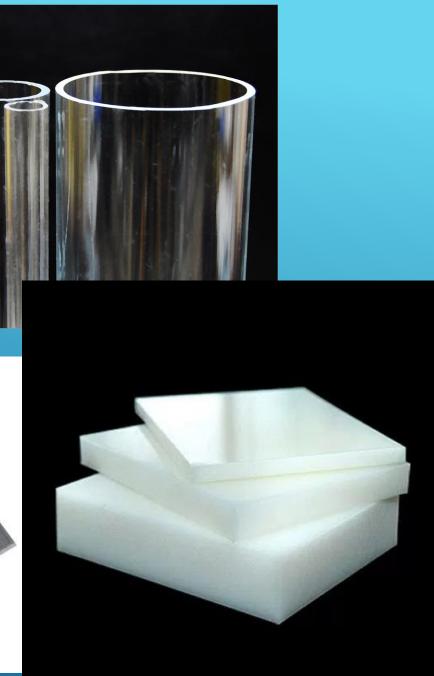
Lay sheets on the downcomer facing in.
