P. serrulata Heer, from the Oligocene of Sakhalin,¹ and also doubtfully recorded from Hokkaido, shows some resemblance in shape and margin, as does P. scottii Heer from the Eocene of Greenland² and Alaska.³ None of the fossil cherries from temperate latitudes in Europe and North America have the slender shape of P. miodavidiana.

Rosa shanwangensis new species

(Plate 24, figs. 2, 3, 4)

Description—Leaflets ovate, broadly cuneate to subcordate at the base, apex acuminate; length 2.1 to 3 cm., width 1.3 cm.; secondaries diverging at angles of about 30° except at the base where they are more spreading, running up rather straight to the margin where they curve up slightly, craspedodrome or with small branches to the teeth; tertiaries obscure, irregularly percurrent; margin coarsely and doubly serrate; texture firm.

Our material is limited to 2 leaflets, which are of somewhat different shape but which resemble each other in the low angle of divergence of the secondaries. It is impossible to indicate certainly the modern affinities of R. shanwangensis, but R. rugosa Thunberg, which is living in Shantung at the present time, has a corresponding range in the shape of its leaflets, and resembles our specimens in the low angle of divergence of the secondaries.⁴ This modern species ranges eastward to Korea and Japan.

There are no closely related fossil species known, although the genus is well represented in the Tertiary of Eurasia and North America.

Spiræa mioblumei new species

(Plate 24, figs. 5, 6)

Description-Leaf oval-obovate, narrowly rounded at the slightly unequal base. the apex broadly rounded; length 2.3 cm., width 1.4 cm.; petiole stout, 1 mm. long; nervation obscure, several secondaries diverging from the midrib at about 30°, curving up toward the apex; margin entire below, in the upper half irregularly and finely serrate; texture firm.

This little leaf closely resembles the leaves of the living S. blumei G. Don,⁵ differing in the less pronounced serration, which may be in individual variation. Another still smaller leaf, shown as figure 6 on plate 24, may also represent this species, as it has the general form and nervation of juvenile leaves of S. blumei. This modern species is found from North and West to Southeast China. Almost equally close to our fossils is S. betulifolia Pallas of North China, of which the variety *æmiliana* Koidzumi occurs also in Japan.

A resemblance is shown to the fossil specimens by S. tenuifolia Engelhardt from the Oligocene of Bohemia.⁶ Another fossil species, S. andersoni Heer from the Eocene of Alaska,⁷ also shows similarity. S. weaveri Hollick from the same locality is larger but represents a leaf of the same type.⁸
